Prior learning					Substantive Knowledge	
Know that: - There are seven continents and five oceans in the world. - Know that Great Britain is not connected to the rest of Europe as we are separated by the sea. - History is split into different periods.					- There was once a land-bridge called Doggerland that connected Great Britain to Europe. This enabled our ancestors to roam freely in search of food. - Stone Age people were known as hunter-gatherers because they hunted and gathered food. They had not yet learned how to grow their own food. - Pre-historic means before written records. In the Stone Age, people drew on cave walls. - People began to settle and build homes. These homes were made of stone, they were round and had a fire in the centre. We have found an example in the Orkney Isles called Skara Brae. - Stonehenge was built in the Stone Age. We do not know why but we do know that there is some connection to the sun. It took over 800 years to complete and they believe the people transported the stones from Wales by rolling them on logs.
